Successful Local Bids

Congratulations to staff and pupils at Roundhill Primary School in Bath who received a grant for more than £1,000 from E.ON's Energising Communities Fund.

The money will help the school to continue its ambition to become more energy efficient and will be used to replace the strip lighting in the school corridors with energy efficient lighting and to purchase an electric timer switch for the water heating to enable the school to better control its heating during the evenings and weekends when it's not needed as much.

It's hoped that the energy improvements will have a direct impact on the energy consumption of the building and reduce energy costs for the school. The school will also be using the funding as a way of encouraging pupils to become more energy wise and to raise awareness of the importance of saving energy.

The school has been using EnergySparks – an online tool, designed to support schools in becoming more energy efficient. It is free to all schools in Bath and North East Somerset <https://www.energysparks.uk/>

The pupils will explore the effect the new lights and electric timer have on the school's energy consumption, which should raise awareness and change behaviour around energy usage in school and at home.

E.ON's Energising Communities Fund was launched in 2013 and since then, E.ON has given away almost £140,000 to 84 community groups and charities in England, Scotland and Wales through the fund.

The fund is closed at present but you can find out more on their website. The closing date for 2018 was 29th January.

Awards for All – Big Lottery	<p>A reminder about this fund which is among the best nationwide small grants programmes due to its accessibility to a wide range of groups and projects.</p> <p>Grants of between £300 and £10,000 are available to help improve local communities and the lives of people most in need, particularly projects and activities that meet one or more of the following outcomes:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Bring people together and build strong relationships in and across communities • Improve the places and spaces that matter to communities • Enable more people to fulfil their potential by working to address issues at the earliest possible stage <p>PLEASE NOTE – it is essential that communities are involved in the design, development and delivery of projects.</p> <p>Voluntary and community organisations, registered charities, constituted groups and clubs, not-for-profit companies, Community Interest Companies, social enterprises, schools and Town and Parish Councils may apply.</p> <p>There is no requirement for match funding.</p> <p>Awards for All will not give more than £10,000 to an organisation in any one year period, but organisations may apply multiple times up to the £10,000 limit (for example, an organisation could theoretically make 10 applications for £1,000 over a 12 month period).</p> <p>Eligible applicants must have:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Two unconnected people on the board or committee • A UK bank account in the name of their organisation • Annual accounts (unless the organisation is less than 15 months old). The Big Lottery Fund is 'keen' to support smaller organisations and will consider low incomes favourably when making a decision <p>Application packs are available from the Awards for All England webpages. The Energy Entrepreneurs Fund – Phase 7	Phase 7 of the Energy Entrepreneurs Fund, a competitive funding scheme to support the development and demonstration of state of the art technologies, products and processes in the areas of energy efficiency, power generation, and heat and electricity storage, is now open for applications.

	<p>The Energy Entrepreneurs Fund seeks the best ideas, irrespective of source, across these energy technology areas from the public and private sector. The scheme particularly aims to assist small and medium-sized enterprises, including start-ups and those companies that are selected will receive additional funding for incubation support.</p> <p>A total of £10 million is available for projects in phase 7, with up to £1 million available for projects up to £250,000.</p> <p>Expressions of Interest by 12pm on 3rd August. Domestic Abuse Fund – Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government (MHCLG)	<p>An £18.8 million fund for local authorities in England to help increase refuge spaces and other accommodation for women fleeing domestic violence.</p> <p>The Fund will support proposals for the provision of core support for refuges and other accommodation-based services, helping local areas ensure that no woman is turned away from the support she needs, and welcomes bids which can demonstrate that:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • There is a need for this type of support locally • The solution proposed is designed to meet the needs of victims

	<p>MHCLG recognise that victims of domestic abuse will have different needs so bids could be for specialist refuge places or for specific groups (i.e. for women with mental health problems, substance abuse problems, or particular needs of different ethnic communities)</p> <p>MHCLG's approach is to benefit all victims of domestic abuse and accepts that men can also be victims. However, women are much more likely than men to be victims of high risk or severe domestic abuse and therefore more in need of refuges and other forms of specialist accommodation based services. The MHCLG expect their fund will primarily focus on the needs of women and children suffering violence.</p> <p>Funding is available for local areas whose bids demonstrate collaboration with one another to ensure that partnerships are joining up across borders to meet the needs of women who may flee to seek support, and collaborate on securing assets of national significance providing specialist provision.</p> <p>Ideally, MHCLG is looking to receive bids that bring together three or more local authorities working across boundaries to form regional hubs where appropriate. Partnerships could include, for example, Health services, Police and Crime Commissioners and/or local specialist domestic violence service providers.</p> <p>MHCLG would expect to provide around £100,000 maximum per Partnership bid, but will consider bids of more than £100,000 which proactively work across a number of local authority boundaries.</p> <p>Bids should be based on provision of funding up to 31st March 2020 only and should indicate how the service provision will be sustained beyond March 2018. All proposals must involve work being delivered in 2018-20. The Integrated Communities Innovation Fund – Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government with Sport	<p>Grants for projects using innovative approaches to sport and physical activity to help build integrated communities in England.</p> <p>The programme has an initial budget of £7 million and is intended to support 'trailblazing approaches' to building more integrated communities in England. The funding is for projects that use sport and physical activity to encourage integration, including:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The level and pace of migration • Labour market disadvantage

England	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Residential segregation and segregation in schools • A lack of meaningful social mixing and certain religious and cultural values and attitudes <p>The funding is for revenue costs for projects that meet the following criteria:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The beneficiaries must be based in England • Approaches must be capable of being delivered to at least 300 participants during the funding period • The funding is for delivery of the agreed-upon project only and will cover costs such as payment to administrators supporting the projects and volunteer expenses, for example • The funding cannot be used for anything other than the delivery of the approach identified by applicants - delivery does not include organisational salaries, PR, marketing and related events organised by the applicant • Costs for sport-based integration projects must be project specific and additional to existing expenditure. Building Connections Fund – Big Lottery	<p>A new Big Lottery Fund grants programme offering grants up to £100,000 for projects that prevent or reduce loneliness and help people, communities and local services in England connect in different ways in England.</p> <p>The Building Connections grant programme has the following overarching aims:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Increase social connections, helping people form strong and meaningful relationships and creating a sense of community and belonging, and helping people feel more connected • Support organisations to build on their existing work, for example by reaching more people, or working in a new area or with a different method or group of people • Encourage organisations to join up with others locally • Improve the evidence base and use learning to inform longer term policy and funding decisions. <p>Funding is for projects that:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Make the best use of community assets and joining up local services to connect people in different local places, from urban to rural, in the workplace, community hubs or pubs or facilitating social mixing in local buildings, indoor and outdoor spaces, and parks. Or in different ways, using digital or technology, transport and travel, participating in sport or volunteering • Enable communities to bring people together and build connections, helping people across all ages, who may be more likely to feel lonely, and encouraging those who are at highest risk of loneliness to participate. If groups are working specifically with young people, they may be eligible to apply to the Youth Strand of the fund • Understand more about the individual benefits of preventing loneliness and what works, resulting in benefits to people's health and well-being, so that they live longer, healthier, more independent lives and improve their opportunities for employment. <p>The funding must be spent on activities that will directly prevent or reduce loneliness and help to build connections between individuals and communities.</p> <p>Revenue costs could include, for example:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Staff salaries • Training and organisational development • Equipment to facilitate activities

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Venue hire • Communications campaigns • Marketing • Project activities and other resources to help run the project or intervention • Resources to implement or develop the project • Costs for learning and evaluation (recognising that applicants will be working with an evaluator as part of their funding). <p>Capital costs – applications can be made for up to 30% of their funding of capital costs to buy, maintain or improve fixed assets that are linked to transport and travel. Applicants will need to secure competitive quotes on all purchases, keep a record of any assets acquired or improved with the funding, and may be subject to additional conditions.</p> <p>The Fund consists of two strands:</p> <p>The Main Fund is made up of close to £9 million, which will be distributed by the Big Lottery Fund, making grants of between £30,000 and £100,000. It is open for applications now.</p> <p>A separate Youth Strand which is made up of £2 million. This strand will open to applications in August 2018 and will be managed by the Co-op Foundation. Grants of up to £80,000 will be available.</p> <p>Projects must start by January 2018 and be completed by March 2021. National Churches Trust Project Development Grants	<p>A new pilot grant scheme offering grants up to £10,000 to enable UK churches to develop high quality sustainable repairs and community projects.</p> <p>The objective of the National Churches Trust pilot Project Development Grants programme is to support churches to become more sustainable through the diagnosis of issues affecting the church, testing the viability of proposed solutions to improve sustainability (for instance by considering local competition) and the development of guiding policies and plans that will be implemented through a subsequent capital or sustainability project.</p> <p>Eligible projects must be in the planning stages (i.e. not yet started) for an urgent structural repair and/or introducing new facilities to widen use of the building.</p> <p>The Trust is particularly interested in applications from the North East of England, Northern Ireland, Scotland and Wales, as well as from Baptist and Presbyterian/Church of Scotland. However, applications from other parts of the UK are also encouraged.</p> <p>There is a match funding requirement. At least 50% of the funds required must be raised by applicants from their own reserves or fundraising initiatives.</p> <p>Applications are accepted from any Christian place of worship in the United Kingdom, listed or unlisted. <i>The Postcode Dream Fund – People's Postcode Lottery</i>	<p><i>Three or four large grants up to £1 million available to give British charities the chance to deliver the project they have always dreamed of, but never had the opportunity to bring to life.</i></p> <p><i>Projects must be innovative, creative and original, and be a genuine 'dream'. General running costs including ongoing staff costs, utility bills, council tax, rent and insurance that are directly linked with the project are eligible for funding. Costs relating to PR and communications and capital costs are eligible for funding.</i></p> <p><i>Projects must have been developed to a point where they are ready to execute within four weeks of receiving notification of a successful application. Projects must also be able to show visible results after 12 months.</i></p> <p><i>The funding pot for 2019 is £3 million, from which three or four large grants of between £500,000 and £1,000,000 will be awarded. Projects must be delivered between 2019 and 2021.</i></p> <p><i>Successful applicants will receive 50% of funding upfront, and the remaining 50% after six months.</i></p> <p><i>The funding priorities for 2019-2021 are:</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • <i>Changing lives through early intervention</i> • <i>Ending loneliness and social isolation</i> • <i>Protecting Britain's biodiversity</i> • <i>Sustainable systems change</i> • <i>Transforming society through sport</i> <p><i>Applications for projects that do not meet one of the funding priorities will also be considered as long as they meet the general funding criteria.</i></p> <p><i>All applications must come from charities in Scotland, England or Wales for projects to be run in these regions. Not-for-profit organisations are encouraged to collaborate to deliver a more effective and wide ranging project.</i></p> <p><i>PLEASE NOTE: all applications must come from at least two organisations. The following conditions apply:</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • <i>One of these organisations must be a registered charity, who will be considered the lead organisation for the project and will enter into a contractual relationship with the Trust in order to deliver the project. <i>The Inshore and Inland Rescue Boat Fund – Department for Transport</i>	<p>Grants for UK charities that operate inland waterway safety boats and/or inshore lifeboats in the UK for equipment to provide emergency support.</p> <p><i>The Inshore and Inland Rescue Boat Fund is a 5-year grant scheme that runs from 2014-2019. The scheme, which is worth £1 million per year, is managed by the Department for Transport.</i></p> <p><i>The funding aims to support the work of life-saving charities which operate lifeboats and other rescue boats on rivers, lakes and other inland waterways within the UK. To date, £3.6 million has been awarded to 98 charities.</i></p> <p><i>Grants can be used to purchase items which will support the charities' lifesaving and rescue operations. In previous years, the funding has been used by charities to invest in capital equipment such as lifeboats, flood rafts or off road</i></p>

	<p><i>vehicles which have already been used in rescue operations, or for the maintenance of their existing equipment, or the purchasing of new equipment for crews, such as personal protective equipment.</i></p> <p><i>UK registered charities which already operate an inland/inshore waterway rescue boat/lifeboat within the UK may apply for a grant. Applicants must:</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • <i>Be a registered charity that is located and operating in the UK</i> • <i>Currently operate an inshore rescue boat/lifeboat in the UK</i> • <i>Be able to provide a letter of support from its tasking authority</i> <p><i>Bids that exceed £50,000 must include plans to offer match funding or a contribution towards total costs.</i></p> <p><i>Applicants must contribute 10% towards the (ex-VAT) cost of items funded. HIV Prevention Innovation Fund – Public Health England	<p>Grants up to £100,000 to voluntary sector organisations for projects of up to a year that support new and innovative ways to prevent HIV transmission and acquisition in England.</p> <p>Public Health England's HIV Prevention Innovation Fund is for voluntary sector organisations, supported by their local council, for local projects that target groups at high risk in England. Projects should offer new and innovative ways of delivering HIV prevention, and explore new ways to address high risk behaviours in the most affected communities. All projects must have measurable outcomes and the potential to be replicated and scaled up by others.</p> <p>Charitable and voluntary sector organisations based and working in England may apply for a grant of between £25,000 and £100,000. The budget for 2018/19 is £600,000.</p> <p>Public Health England welcomes all innovative proposals and particularly those that:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Promote third-sector led support for combination prevention and harm reduction throughout the continuum of care • Promote the prompt diagnosis, especially through frequent testing, of both HIV and other sexually transmitted infections • Address stigma associated with HIV • Address the wider determinants of high risk sexual behaviour such as mental health and drug and alcohol misuse • Support the integration of HIV prevention into health promotion and service delivery in other health areas (for example, integration into sexual and reproductive health services, primary care pregnancy planning and antenatal care); and/or

Developing Game-Changing Business Innovations – Innovate UK	<p>Innovate UK has up to £20 million to invest in the best new ideas for products and services developed from cutting-edge technologies. Ideas can come from any area of technology, science or engineering, including arts, design and creative industries, and can be applied in any sector of the economy.</p> <p>The competition is part of Innovate UK's open funding programme and will support a range of projects from feasibility studies to longer industrial research and experimental development projects.</p> <p>Projects must demonstrate they have a game-changing idea that could lead to new commercial products, processes or services.</p> <p>Projects can be led by a business working alone or with partners or by a research and technology organisation. Children Affected by Domestic Abuse Fund	<p>A new £8 million Home Office fund available to organisations in England and Wales to support children who are exposed to domestic abuse.</p> <p>The Children Affected by Domestic Abuse Fund is a new Home Office programme worth £8 million over the 2018/19 and 2019/20 financial years. The objective of the fund is to provide support to children in England and Wales who are exposed to domestic abuse.</p> <p>Bids must demonstrate how their support will link into wider support for victims of domestic abuse at a local level. Charities, Digital Technology and Young People	<p>Charities are failing to use digital technology effectively to help disadvantaged young people, according to a recent report by the think tank NPC. "My Best Life: Priorities for Digital Technology in the Youth Sector" says that many charities using digital technology do not consider the circumstances many disadvantaged people face. The 31-page report is based on 12 months of research with young people experiencing multiple disadvantages in the London borough of Camden.</p> <p>The young people were asked how digital technology could be used to tackle the challenges and opportunities they faced in building better lives for themselves. Common problems were low levels of digital literacy outside social media, insufficient resources to pay for devices except mobile phones and the cost of data on phones.</p> <p>The proposals in the report include developing an app similar to Google Maps that would allow disadvantaged young people to find and review the local support they require, such as mental health services. This reduces the donation process to within three seconds.”</p> <p>Addition created the system after the success of its Enterprise platform, designed for larger charities such as the NSPCC, the Stroke Association and the Alzheimer’s Society. <p>Social Prescribing – Just Do It An Article from Clarity ‘CIC’</p>	<p>Social prescribing, essentially enabling people to find and use support services in their community that will improve their health and wellbeing, should be going mainstream.</p> <p>It seems to me blindingly obvious that such an approach is a good thing. But much more importantly, there is now considerable evidence that it works.</p> <p>Take a look at the articles on social prescribing on the Healthy London Partnership NHS and the King’s Fund websites (links below). The evidence shows it works for patients, carers and their families and it works for the system. That is, it can save money by reducing hospital admissions and enabling people to stay healthier and independent for longer.</p> <p>It is not difficult to see the logic. The benefits of getting more people to use services that already have a well evidenced track record – be it in mental health, physical fitness, housing, debt management and reducing loneliness doesn’t require a great leap of faith. And yet we are still seeing a lot of effort, and money, going into further research, scoping, modelling and business cases.</p> <p>At the end of last year two next door areas in the South West received separate Life Chances Fund development grants (now closed to Expressions of Interest) to work up proposals for social prescribing in their areas. Thank goodness they are collaborating and I know every area is different (to an extent). But isn’t about time that the money that is available focussed on putting social prescribing into practice? I suspect it is endemic across our culture but there really does seem to be a prevailing “not evidenced here” syndrome.</p> <p>OK, in many ways Rotherham (a well-recognised social prescribing case study) is very different to, say, Devon. Lloyds Bank launches £500 million Growth Fund	<p>Lloyds Banking Group has opened a £500 million pound loan fund to help British businesses finance equipment. Research on mental health and social relationships	<p>Mental illness has huge cost implications for society and the NHS in terms of lost work days and healthcare. Research into the health effect of social networks and interaction could inform cost-efficient mental health initiatives and policies. Depression, anxiety and other psychological conditions cost the UK an estimated £77 billion a year. Experts predict that by 2020 depression will be second only to heart disease as an international health problem. Social isolation has long been known as a key trigger for mental illness, while supportive relationships with friends, family and neighbours are beneficial to the mental health of individuals and the population. Other forms of social interaction such as volunteering are also known to boost wellbeing.</p> <p>People with supportive friends and family generally have better mental and physical health than those who lack these networks. The same is true for those who take part in churches, clubs and voluntary organisations. It is only by analysing people's lives over time within a structural, social and cultural context that we can establish whether social relationships really do contribute to better health and increased wellbeing – or whether better health and more energy in the first place enable people to invest in relationships with family and friends.</p> <p>Researchers at the ESRC-funded International Centre for Lifecourse Studies In Society and Health have examined how social networks have a positive psychological impact. Attachment theory suggests that people with secure childhoods may be better at relationships of any kind – for instance making friends at school and work, or getting on well with neighbours. Fundraising Advice – Hold a Fast Party	<p>The idea behind a Fast Party is not to plough through the buffet at a party as quickly as possible, but to ‘fast’ – as in abstaining from eating. A Fast Party is actually a non-event, whereby people are invited to a party that isn’t going to take place. This type of fundraiser works particularly well with well-known charitable organisations with a strong supporter base either locally or nationally. Guests are asked to go without one meal on a specific date and to contribute the money that would otherwise be spent on the meal to your not-for-profit. The advantage of this fundraising idea is that it:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Requires very little organising • Doesn’t require a venue • Has very little financial outlay – all you’re paying for is the cost of the invitations (and you could get a sponsor for this in return for a bit of advertising) • Can be quite easy to obtain sponsorship. <p>Disadvantages are relatively few. The main drawback is that supporters who may already be contributing to the charity or cause may feel ‘put upon’ by another request for help.</p> <p>It’s also a fundraising idea you should be wary of overusing. It’s okay as a witty, fun one-off activity, but at best this should be an annual event and possibly take place even less frequently.</p> <p>To organise a Fast Party, find a couple or several friends to help write a Guest List and put together an eye-catching, well-designed and witty invitation (for example, ‘Mr and Mrs Smith have pleasure in not requesting your company.....’ or ‘Guests of Honour will not include...’).</p> <p>You could also print an unappetising menu on the back of the invitation to</p>	

	<p>show ‘participants’ that they’ve had a lucky escape. Include a vegetarian option.</p> <p>Print the invitations on good quality card (you guests may want the option of displaying the invitation on their 599antelpiece) and include a self-addressed envelope or set up an online payment system so that participants can make their financial contribution easily – or you could just pop round to a supporters’ house to collect their donation.</p> <p>Make sure that cheques are made out to the charity or cause rather than to an individual, which could lead you open to criticism or, worse, accusations of fraud. Tickets to the party could be £5 per person, £8 per couple or £10 per family, whatever you think is appropriate for your supporters.</p> <p>The advantage for ‘participants’ is that they don’t have to do anything to participate. A Fast Party enables them to show their support for a cause at a relatively low cost without having to spend much effort, plan, or use up valuable time and effort.</p> <p>In terms of return, most Fast Parties report at least 50% of invitees making a donation. Some may not wish to participate but may still be willing to make a donation.</p> <p>Finally, always send a short thank-you letter, telling donors how the funding will be used and the difference it will make!</p>

Fundraising – Auctions of	Auctions of Promises tend to be most successful when held on the back of another event when equipment and furniture is already available.	

Promises	<p>A good Auction of Promises (50 lots takes about an hour to get through if you have a good auctioneer) can often raise £1,000 or more.</p> <p>An Auction of Promises is held on identical lines to a conventional auction, but the 'lots' are quite different. Each lot is a 'Promise', usually written on individual slips of paper and signed and dated by the person offering the promise. Promises are secured by asking around your contacts, private companies or prominent individuals in the community, such as the Mayor or your local MP. It's a good idea to have a wide selection of lots, for example, handmade goods, offers of help, vouchers, special opportunities and donated items. Example of promises can include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Theatre tickets • Having your car(s) cleaned • A free round of golf • A week's holiday in a country cottage or an apartment overseas • A free meal at a local restaurant <p>To organise an Auction of Promises, follow these steps:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Get together a small group of helpers or form a committee; 2. Decide on a date and a venue and apply for an occasional licence if you intend to run a bar, which could usefully increase the amount of funding raised; 3. Find an auctioneer who will ideally volunteer their time. If you can get one, a professional auctioneer will bring a sense of authenticity as well as ensuring the auction moves along at a brisk pace. If someone other than an experienced auctioneer wants to do it. It's essential they have a presence; 4. Proactively seek donations and promises. Make sure you get specific commitments from people or companies. Type up the promises and get

	<p>them signed before the donor can pull out! Make it clear the offer is available for a limited period only, for instance 6 months or a year.</p> <p>5. Prepare a catalogue showing images and the running order of all the lots which can be shown online or handed out at the event. It can help if you publish a reserve price for each lot to give participants an idea of where to begin bidding.</p> <p>To keep things interesting:</p> <p>Include a Surprise Auction: keep 2-3 popular lots in unmarked envelopes. Announce that the next lot is one of the unmarked promises, but bidders won't know which one it is. Participants make 'blind bids' and the successful bidder receives a surprise (it's important not to announce the lots until all have been auctioned).</p> <p>Include a Sealed Bid Auction: this is where you display the lots and make pens, papers and envelopes available. Bidders place their bids in sealed envelopes and place them in a box. The winners are announced at the end of the Promises Auction. It's worth bearing in mind that Sealed Bid Auctions don't generally raise as much funding.</p> <p>At the end of the Auction, try to encourage all successful bidders to pay before they leave. Thank the auctioneer with a bottle of wine and flowers. Make sure you have sufficient volunteers to clear up. After the event, thank your donors, volunteers and successful bidders and let them know how much has been raised and how the funds will be used.</p> <p>Ensure the Auction is reported in the local and social media (this can also be done in real-time during the event), together with the amount raised. An Auction of Promises is a great PR opportunity because you can gain additional publicity as people redeem their promises throughout the 6 months or year.</p>

The top four factors that encourage people to give are:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The charity is clear about what donations are spent on (56%); • Learning about the impact which the charity has (47%); • Positive stories about the charity in the media (37%); • Case stories/stories about individuals that have been helped (33%). <p>Different age groups tend to be motivated by different factors, so those over 55 years old are more likely to want the charity to be clear about what its donations are spent on, as well wanting more information about impact. In contrast people under the age of 35 want case stories much more than older groups (40%+ for the under 35s vs around 30% for the other age groups), as well as fundraising events to take part in, thank you's, celebrity endorsements, and volunteering opportunities. All age groups want good stories in the media, and a strong media presence.</p> <p>Donors like to see great case studies and human stories – a clear mix of the information that motivates and inspires, and information that convinces them their donation isn't being wasted. More interesting perhaps is how young people want more than other age groups: they wanted to be engaged as a whole supporter: to give and to volunteer, to take part and be thanked.</p> <p>WHAT PUTS PEOPLE OFF?</p> <p>The most significant factor that puts people off from giving to charity is the persistence and intrusiveness of fundraising. JARGON BUSTER

- CIC: Community Interest Company (non-profit company)
- Registered Charity: non-profit organisations registered with the Charity Commission with charitable objects (these can be unincorporated or also registered as companies with Companies House)
- CIO: Charity Incorporated Organisation (incorporated legal structure for charities regulated by the Charity Commission)
- Association with charitable aims and objectives: formal group with a constitution which is charitable but not registered with the Charity Commission (most likely because their income is below the £5,000 threshold)
- Constituted community group: formal group with a constitution which lays out issues around membership, who can make decisions, what they do and how they will use any money etc
- Un-constituted community group: generally small groups who have come together because of a shared issue, or to set up support within their geographical community. Tend to be organised informally and have no written rules around their group
- CASCs: Community and Amateur Sports Clubs. Groups who are constituted and whose core purpose is amateur sport.
