Learning from deaths due to suicide, across the Avon Coroner's Court area

This report contains information about deaths from suicide and injuries of undetermined intent in Avon during the calendar year 2016. The four councils in the Avon area have a responsibility to produce action plans to help reduce the risk of suicide in their local populations.

Some of the highest risk groups in Avon are similar to those known nationally, including:

- young and middle aged men (from 30-59 years old)
- people in contact with mental health services
- people with a history of self-harm
- offenders.

The largest number of deaths for males was in the

age group.

from suicide and undetermined intent during the 2016 calendar year were reviewed by the Coroner's Court in Avon.

of people overall had been in contact with acute mental health services in the previous year, which is very similar to the national figure.

A further 31% of people had been in contact with some sort of counselling service in the community, meaning that in total 56% of people were engaged in help in relation to their mental health.

The most common location for suicide was the person's home.
