



Esafety Resources and Lessons Plans

The following is a collection of links to resources that teachers can use to supplement and enhance their teaching of esafety. It is essential that esafety is embedded into all aspects of the computing curriculum and that the school's bullying and safety guidance integrates with esafety.

Esafety is about teaching students to use appropriate behaviours and engage with technology wisely, supported by a knowledge of the possible risks and an understanding of the possible consequences of actions taken. Esafety is to be taught as an on-going curriculum thread and not as a one off event.

From the National Curriculum (Sept 2014)

Key Stage 1:

All pupils should be taught to use technology safely and respectfully, keeping personal information private; identify where to go for help and support when they have concerns about content or contact on the internet or other online technologies.

Key Stage 2:

All pupils should be taught to use technology safely, respectfully and responsibly; recognise acceptable/unacceptable behaviour; identify a range of ways to report concerns about content and contact.

Key Stage 3:

All pupils should be taught to understand a range of ways to use technology safely, respectfully, responsibly and securely, including protecting their online identity and privacy; recognise inappropriate content, contact and conduct and know how to report concerns.

Key Stage 4:

All pupils should be taught to understand how changes in technology affect safety, including new ways to protect their online privacy and identity, and how to identify and report a range of concerns.
