Agenda

1. Current plan and priorities

- Highlighted the Council's current proposals and priorities for the delivery of HVM to protect crowded spaces in Bath.
- Avon & Somerset CTSA's acknowledged these and supported the work completed to date and suggested proposals, including the provision of access restrictions and HVM for Cheap St/ Westgate St/ Saw Close and Upper Borough Walls, given the footfall, particularly crossing Stall St and Union St.

2. HVM types considered

- Explained that we have been meeting with suppliers recommended by CPNI to determine product specifications that could fit around the constraints of Georgian Bath i.e. shallow services and cellars.
- Gated options are unlikely to be considered for the access restrictions as they restrict pedestrian flow through narrow streets and could impede flow during an evacuation incident.
- Gated options have not been excluded from the thought process for event management as part of Bath Rugby match days.

3. Security protection period

- ASP supported the proposal for access restriction bollards to be in place 24hrs/ 7 days a week to create a secure sterile area, with exemptions for deliveries etc during certain periods (to be determined).
- They recognised the difficulty of blue badge holders and accommodating businesses within each security zone.

4. Proposed monitoring and operation

- Highlighted our preferred solution to have an electronic system to operate and monitor each access point, together with layered CCTV and intercom system, similar to that in Cardiff.
- Further discussion required with Cabinet members and director group regarding revenue funding.

5. Next steps and estimated programme

- Design solutions and costs required for presentation to directors group early September. Needs to include both capital installation and revenue operational and maintenance costs.
- For justification purposes, LD asks about typical cost of an attack. PN/ JJT explained that typical cost of the Borough Market attack was

£1.4M, which was largely borne by local businesses and took 6-9 months for the area to recover.

6. Required CTSA advice

• Likely that we would require CTSA advice and support whilst promoting access restrictions for York St and Cheap St.

7. A.O.B

- Need to consider justification criteria for road closure for protection of crowded spaces.
- CNJ to invite ST to nect York St co-ordination to discuss potential collaborative approach to deliver HVM around the Abbey during final footway reinstatement.
