Title of savings proposal	Prevention of a 2 nd Fall	

Brief Description and Aim (no more than 100 words)

B&NES has a higher level of hospital admissions for falls than the England average. The most effective interventions for preventing a second fall are a combination of targeted strategies, primarily a multifactorial falls risk assessment and management program, with exercise as a consistently key component.

Multifactorial interventions for individuals at high risk of falling or who have already experienced a fall centre on a comprehensive assessment followed by tailored strategies. Key components include reviewing and adjusting medications to minimise side effects impacting balance, assessing and modifying home environments to reduce hazards, optimising vision and hearing, and ensuring the use of assistive devices and appropriate footwear. These interventions work best when combined and personalised to address each individual's specific risk factors.

Purpose: To reduce the incidence and severity of falls in individuals at risk (primarily those aged 65+ and other at-risk groups) by providing evidence-based, multifactorial interventions (e.g., exercise, home assessments, medication reviews).

Intended Outcomes:

- Reduced number of falls and fall-related injuries
- Improved quality of life and independence for service users.
- Reduced demand on acute health and social care services.
- Equitable access to prevention initiatives across all community groups.
- Reduce the number of people needing residential care following a 2nd fall.

Target Population: People aged 65 and over, and those aged 50-64 with underlying conditions that have had a fall and that put them at a higher risk of falling a second time.
