Technology Enabled Care, such as telecare and daily living aids, helps reduce the need for in-person care while maintaining or improving outcomes.

Adult Social Care have a statutory duty to review a person's care package at least once a year. Demand for social care continues to rise with over 2000 requests for assessment made each year. Reablement supports individuals to regain lost skills and confidence after a period of illness, injury, or hospital stay. Enablement is a broader, ongoing approach focused on promoting independence by reducing barriers and building on existing strengths and capabilities, even for those with long-term conditions or disabilities.
