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Section A: Successful Local Bids

Congratulations to Bath City Farm which will open its new community café to the public on Wednesday 11 May, following more than twenty years of planning and 7 months of building work.

Since 2016 over £500,000 has been raised to pay for the build and fit-out. This included grants from St John's Foundation, Bath and North East Somerset Community Infrastructure

Levy Fund, the Power to Change Community Business Fund, Enover, Bath Disability Trust and Bath and West Community Energy.

The café will be open Tuesday to Friday from 9 am to 4.30 pm serving breakfast, lunch, coffee and cake.

The café will also provide work experience opportunities through a new Roots to Work programme funded by the West of England Combined Authority. This is for people who have come through Bath City Farm's established mental health programmes or programmes for adults with learning needs. Trainees will be supported to carry out a range of catering and hospitality tasks at the café including till use, food, and drink preparation, front of house service, general kitchen cleaning and waste management.

The café will aim to generate a profit that can be reinvested directly back into the Farm's charitable activities, helping to ensure the longevity and financial resilience of the charity.

Name of Fund	Description
Chewing Gum task Force Grants – Keep Britain Tidy	<p>The Chewing Gum Task Force Grant Scheme is open to councils across the UK who wish to clean the gum off the pavements in their local areas and invest in long-term behaviour change to prevent gum from being dropped in the first place. In the first year of the scheme, more than £1.7 million has been invested by chewing gum producers.</p> <p>The Chewing Gum Task Force brings together some of the country's major chewing gum producers, including Mars Wrigley and Perfetti Van Melle, as well as some producers of nicotine replacement therapy gum. Under the scheme, administered by independent environmental charity Keep Britain Tidy.</p> <p>Grants of up to £20,000 are available to individual councils in England, Northern Ireland, Scotland and Wales to fund street cleansing and/or the purchase of cleaning equipment. Larger grants of up to £70,000 are available for two or more councils working together to achieve greater impact.</p> <p>Councils will also benefit from a bespoke gum litter prevention package, including targeted behaviour change signage and advice to encourage people to bin their gum. Previous pilots run by Mars Wrigley and Behaviour Change using this signage have reduced gum littering by up to 64%.</p>

	<p>The fund is now open to Expressions of Interest. Formal applications will be welcomed in a two week window between 9 and 23 May 2022, and decisions will be announced by the end of May 2022.</p> <p>https://www.keepbritaintidy.org/local-authorities/reduce-litter/gum-litter/chewing-gum-task-force</p>
<p>Community Grants – Nationwide Foundation</p>	<p>These grants support local charities, Cooperatives and Community Land Trusts to find local solutions to tackle the housing crisis. These organisations can apply for grants of up to £50,000 to fund projects which help people in housing need.</p> <p>The Foundation divide the UK up into 11 regions, each with its own Community Board made up of Nationwide members and colleagues from that region.</p> <p>The number of applications in each region is capped at 40. This means 1 in 4 applications will be successful.</p> <p>Projects will need to support one of the Foundation’s three aims:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> helping people into a home preventing them from losing their home or supporting them to thrive at home <p>Applications close on 27 May, or when the regional cap is reached.</p> <p>https://www.nationwidecommunitygrants.co.uk/</p>
<p>NFU Mutual Charitable Trust grants</p>	<p>The Trust focuses on providing funding to larger initiatives, which would have a significant impact on the rural community. The Trustees are particularly interested in initiatives in the areas of education of young people in rural areas and relief of poverty within rural areas.</p> <p>The Trustees meet twice a year to consider applications received. These meetings are currently held in June and November.</p> <p>Applications for the June meeting must be submitted by 27 May 2022 and for the November meeting they must be submitted by 28 October 2022.</p> <p>https://www.nfumutual.co.uk/about-us/charitable-trust/applications-for-funding/</p>
<p>The Co-op Local Community Fund</p>	<p>Revenue grants of between £1,000 and £3,000 are available for projects that benefit local communities in areas in which Co-op food stores and funeral homes have a presence in the UK and the Isle of Man. Projects that provide access to food and healthy eating, improve mental wellbeing, encourage biodiversity and provide opportunities for children and young people are particularly welcomed.</p> <p>This is a public voting grant programme, whereby Co-op community members vote on the project they want to support in their local community. Projects should be in communities that are served by a Co-op Food store or a Co-op Funeral Home. Up to 3 projects in each</p>

community will be selected for grant support. Priority will be given to organisations with an income of under £1 million a year.

Please note that, although the deadline for applications is Sunday 29 May 2022 and successful applicants will be announced in October 2022, the public voting process takes 12 months, meaning that funding will only be released in November 2023. Applicants should therefore align their project proposal with this timescale.

Grants, which can be used to cover project costs or salaries, are expected to be for between £1,000 and £3,000 for projects that:

- Enable people to access food and co-operate together to feed everyone.
- Help improve people's mental wellbeing.
- Help people protect local biodiversity or tackle climate change by reducing carbon emissions, and/or
- Offer young people opportunities to develop new skills and make a difference in their community.

Projects should:

- Benefit a local community in which the Co-op has a presence.
- Meet the Co-op's values of self-help, self-responsibility, democracy, equality, equity and solidarity.
- Not have religious or political aims (although religious groups can apply).
- Take place in the UK or Isle of Man, and
- Take place or will still be running after November 2023.

The application process is as follows:

- Applicants should create an account on the Co-op website.
- Applications must be submitted by midnight on **Sunday 29 May 2022**.
- The Co-op will then shortlist up to 3 projects to support in each community over the next giving period. This is usually for the next 12 months.
- Applicants will find out if they've been shortlisted by October 2022. Shortlisted projects will be part of the Local Community Fund from 23 October 2022 to 21 October 2023.
- Selected projects will be displayed in store and online in order that Co-op members can vote for which project they want to support.
- Applicants will receive funding in November 2023.

<p>Force for Change – Armed Forces Covenant Fund Trust</p>	<p>Grants up to £10,000 for one year for projects that make a real difference to Armed Forces communities locally. The Trust funds projects that offer support to Armed Forces communities to help with needs that may not have been addressed in the past. This can also include funding for pilot projects; or to try new ways of offering local support. It can also include projects that build on earlier work that you have done.</p> <p>To be eligible to apply, your organisation must be one of the following.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • A registered charity or Community Interest Company (CIC) with substantial recent experience of supporting Armed Forces communities and have been registered for at least one year at the time of your application. • An Armed Forces unit or base. • A local authority. • A school. • A statutory body that delivers or co-ordinates NHS care <p>Deadlines and dates to note:</p> <p>If you apply by midday on 30 May 2022, you'll receive a decision by the end of August 2022.</p> <p>If you apply by midday on 8 August 2022, you'll receive a decision in late October 2022.</p> <p>If you apply by midday on 14 November 2022, you'll receive a decision in late February 2023.</p> <p>https://covenantfund.org.uk/programme/force-for-change/</p>
<p>Rosa Stand With Us Fund</p>	<p>One-off grants up to £25,000 are available to frontline women's organisations across the UK that are governed and led by women and actively addressing violence against women and girls in the UK.</p> <p>ROSA's Stand With Us Fund has been established to support the many organisations run by and for women who stand up and take action every day to address violence against women and girls (VAWG).</p> <p>The Fund aims to empower and strengthen frontline Violence Against Women and Girls (VAWG) organisations to build safer futures for women and girls. Through this fund, one-year grants of up to £25,000 will be offered to fund organisational development work. Grants are available for the period October 2022 to September 2023.</p> <p>Funding is available to organisations with an average annual income over the last 3 years of between £100,000 and £500,000.</p> <p>ROSA's aim for the Fund is to enable organisations to be in a stronger position to survive, thrive and grow by investing in organisational development work such as (please note that this is not an exclusive list):</p>

<p>The Enterprise Development Programme (Black and Minoritised Communities)</p>	<p>Grants up to £30,000 together with additional capacity building support are available to enable not-for-profit agencies led by and working with Black and minoritised communities move towards new trading models, Please note that the programme is only available in specific areas of England.</p> <p>The Enterprise Development Programme for Black and Minoritised Communities is designed to help not-for-profit organisations transition to</p>

new trading models with the objective of helping them to become more financially resilient. Applicants may also have the ultimate aim of taking on social investment in the future.

Capacity building support is available to not-for-profit agencies led by and working with Black and minoritised communities in the following geographic areas:

- Humber and Yorkshire.
- London,
- The Midlands,
- The North West and
- The South West of England.

The following package of support is available:

- Grants of up to £30,000 to research or test out new ideas, to launch new enterprises or grow existing ones (grants are likely to be subject to agreed milestones or evidence of growing income sources).
- Access to a team of pro bono legal experts to provide support with the legal considerations of trading.
- Invitations to conferences on enterprise development and social investment within the wider charitable sector.
- Peer-learning and networking opportunities, and
- Training and learning opportunities tailored to needs.

Applicants must meet the following criteria to qualify for the programme:

- Be a constituted charity, voluntary sector organisation, or social enterprise.
- Can commit to playing an active part in contributing to the shared learning within the enterprise movement network.
- Can demonstrate evidence of trading or is actively looking to diversify and grow income through trading.
- Can evidence current trading activities, which require support/development, or commitment from senior management and the Board to pilot/test a coherent trading idea.
- Distributes less than 50% of post-tax profits and reinvests at least 51% of surpluses into pursuing its social mission.
- Has a clear social mission.
- Has a constitutional or contractual lock on its social mission, dividend and surplus distribution policy (also known as an asset lock).
- Has a minimum of 70% of the board of trustees and at least 51% of senior staff from a Black, Asian or minority ethnic background.
- Has been operating as a registered company/charity for at least two years, and
- Has the staff capacity and support of the board of trustees to engage fully with the programme.

	<p>There is a 2-stage application process, consisting of:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Stage 1 - applicants are required to outline their organisation's mission, provide details about their leadership and provide a top-line explanation on their proposed trading activity, and • Stage 2 – applicants that are successful at Stage 1 will be invited to complete a Stage 2 Full Application form. <p>The application windows for submissions to Stage 1 are:</p> <p>Monday 23 May to Monday 13 June 2022, and Tuesday 6 September to Tuesday 27 September 2022.</p> <p>A further application window is expected to be announced for December 2022.</p>
<p>The Cultural Investment Fund (England)</p>	<p>Grants are available to cultural organisations across England for infrastructure projects at museums, improvements in local library services and investment in community-focused cultural sites.</p> <p>Cultural organisations across England, including museums, galleries and public libraries are being encouraged to submit expressions of interest to the Cultural Investment Fund following the previous allocation of £48 million worth of funding to 60 organisations earlier this year. Funding of infrastructure projects at museums, improvements in local library services and investment in community-focused cultural sites will ensure that these cultural assets at the heart of communities is expected to help regional economies and protect their unique local heritage for generations to come.</p> <p>The Cultural Investment Fund covers the following three streams:</p> <p>Cultural Development Fund Round 3 - the £49.4 million Cultural Development Fund aims to give people access to arts and culture in areas with historically low levels of cultural engagement to help support economic growth. <p>The Volant Charitable Trust Covid-19 Response Fund</p>	<p>Revenue grants are available to UK registered charities and social enterprises that are supporting vulnerable members of society and reducing social deprivation among people who have been adversely impacted by COVID-19.</p> <p>The Volant Charitable Trust was established by the author J K Rowling, principally to support women and children's causes in Scotland. Its COVID-19 Response Fund is, however, open to all charities and social enterprises across the UK that can evidence how they can help reduce social deprivation by supporting vulnerable members of society that have been negatively impacted by COVID.</p> <p>Volant's COVID-19 Response Fund is a revenue-only grant fund that will support project and administrative costs (the Trust does not fund capital expenditure).</p> <p>Registered charities, community groups, Community Interest Companies and social enterprises based and working in the UK may apply for a grant.</p> <p>There are no minimum or maximum grant levels for the Fund. <p>Forces Communities – Armed Forces Covenant Trust</p>	<p>needs, as well as needs that are more well known. For exceptional projects, larger grants may be available</p> <p>Applications need to be clear about the evidence of why the project is needed and how the impact of the project will continue after the grant has ended.</p> <p>They will be more likely to fund projects that focus on specific groups of people within Armed Forces communities, rather than more general approaches. They are also keen to see that the people who will benefit from the project have been able to shape how it will be delivered.</p> <p>Charities and CICs can apply for a grant. <p>Esmée Fairbairn Collections Fund</p>	<p>This fund supports museums to use their collections to become relevant and sustainable organisations that are connected to and valued by their communities. All applications to the fund must focus on existing collections, typically held by an accredited museum or partnership of museums and other organisations, and the funded work must engage and involve audiences to achieve public benefit.</p> <p>In 2022 they have simplified the grants they are offering, recognising the challenge of the pandemic and seeking ways to build on the great work undertaken in the last two years.</p> <p>This year they will offer grants of up to £90k over around two years for museums to test new, ambitious, creative collections engagement that has a social impact. <p><i>The Andor Charitable Trust</i></p>	<p><i>Grants of between £1,000 and £5,000 are available to registered charities based and working in the UK, particularly those that are involved in providing medical and ancillary services, education, helping the aged and disabled, relieving poverty and developing the arts.</i></p> <p><i>The overarching objectives of the Andor Charitable Trust are to maintain, support or contribute to registered charities across the United Kingdom, including those engaged in:</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <i>• Developing the Arts.</i> <i>• Education.</i> <i>• Helping the aged and disabled.</i> <i>• Medical and ancillary services, and</i> <i>• The relief of poverty.</i> <p><i>Grant awards tend to be for between £1,000 and £5,000 with no matched funding requirement. <p><i>The Sofronie Foundation</i></p>	<p><i>Grants of varying sizes for charities and non-registered charities in the UK, France and the Netherlands that are improving social mobility through educational opportunities and/or providing a pathway out of poverty for children and young people disadvantaged by a lack of opportunity.</i></p> <p><i>The Sofronie Foundation's overriding aim is to promote social mobility by improving educational opportunities and by providing pathways out of poverty for children and young people disadvantaged by a lack of opportunity. There was a launch event on 5 May and a networking session on 12 May.</p> <p>The fund opened for applications on 5 May with a deadline of 9 June.</p>

	<p>Community and voluntary (not for profit) sector groups in the West of England are able to apply. It is expected to run until 2024/5</p> <p>It offers capital grants up to £250,000 and revenue grants up to £50,000 for UK community organisations to take on the sustainable ownership of community assets such as community buildings, community shops and parks that are at risk of being lost to a local area.</p> <p>The new £150 million Community Ownership Fund, which will be available through a number of application rounds between 2021-2025, is designed to enable and support UK community organisations to take ownership of assets such as parks, pubs and theatres.</p> <p>Applicants will be expected to prove that an asset is likely to be lost to the local area if the community does not intervene, and that local people will use it if it is taken over. Applicants will also have to show how the asset will be sustainable in the long term once it moves into community ownership.</p> <p>Charities can bid for grants of up to £50,000 in revenue funding, and the government will match fund up to £250,000 in capital costs.</p> <p>The Community Ownership Fund can provide up to 50% of the capital funding required up to the maximum £250,000 grant level. Applicants will be expected to secure 50% matched funding from other sources, including lenders, social investors, community share offers, statutory organisations, including local authorities, grant-making Trusts and National Lottery funders. However, the required 50% match does not have to be in place by the application deadline.</p> <p>Matched funding can also include 'in-kind' contributions, such as equipment, property and waived professional fees.</p>

Grants can be used to:

- Acquire a physical community asset or facility at risk, such as land and buildings which deliver a benefit to local people.
- Move a community amenity to a new, more appropriate location within the same community. This might be because a different location offers better value to continue the amenity, or because the venue is in itself an asset of community value.
- Renovate, repair or refurbish the asset, only where this is part of a sale or transfer to save a community asset at risk and where this is critical to saving the asset and making it sustainable.
- Set up a new community business or buy an existing business in order to save an asset or amenity of importance to the community, and/or
- The purchase of associated stock, collections or intellectual property, where it is associated with buying a physical asset or buying a business to save an amenity.

Applicants can apply for a blend of the following funding:

1. Capital grants to take ownership (including the acquisition of the building; refurbishment costs alongside a sale or a transfer). Up to £250,000 match-funded capital will be available for most asset types. Exceptionally bidders will be able to make the case for up to £1 million match-funding to help establish a community-owned sports club or help buy a sports club or ground at risk of being lost without community intervention.
2. Funding for project development - this might include professional fees for technical advice from architects or surveyors or legal advice. It might also include costs for project management to oversee capital works where this is part of an application.
3. Post-acquisition support funding for up to the first year of operation, where there is a convincing case that this will help support a sustainable business model in the long term. Up to £50,000 (and no more than 20% of the total capital costs applied for through the Fund) is available for project development costs and post-acquisition support.

To be eligible for investment from the Fund, the terms of community ownership must be either the ownership of the freehold or a long-term leasehold of at least 25 years minimum (with no break clauses).

Proposals will need to prove the value of the asset to local people and that the asset can run sustainably for the long-term benefit of the community. Projects could include (please note this is not an exclusive list):

- Community Centres.
- Community Shops.
- Cinemas.
- Galleries.
- Libraries.
- Museums.
- Music venues.
- Parks.
- Performance Spaces.
- Post Offices.
- Public Houses.

At an event in the UK this summer, 50 fund raisers were asked what annoys them most about application processes. Their responses are summarized below:

- Word counts – this was the most frequent response e.g. “word restrictions along with wanting complex answers”.
- A lack of response – whether this was a lack of feedback, not being available to discuss bids or not hearing back e.g. “not getting a ‘no’ just hearing nothing”
- The sheer length, complexity and diversity of information requested e.g. “the large amount of information you have to give e.g. 3 references”.
- Being asked for unnecessary information – bugbears were being asked to submit documents available online via charity commission website and being asked financial questions that are covered in the accounts.



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<p>Reading the Funding Guidelines: Why You Don't and Why You Should - Advice from Emma Beeston</p>	<p>Ask any funder their top reason for turning down an application and they will say "because the applicant did not read the guidance". This has sadly been the case for the many years, despite all the training sessions and guides out there for fundraisers. Which begs the question: why don't people read the guidance? Or if they do read it, why do they go ahead and apply anyway even though they don't fit with the criteria.</p> <p>These are the 7 reasons I have come up with. They fall into three categories: one is excusable once; three are operational and the final three relate to a mindset.</p>	
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Not found: People don't always know to look for any guidance. If someone is new to bid writing, then this is fair enough. Hopefully this will be pointed out to them early on and then there is no excuse for making this mistake twice.

Unclear: People can struggle with reading and so it is up to funders to help with this – after all they are trying to fund work that achieves social change not testing literacy. The guidance is not always clear or consistent and can be jargon-rich. Some funders help by being available to talk to potential applicants or using films and webinars to explain their criteria and funding process.

Too tedious: Reading lists of we do fund ... and we don't fund ... do not make for riveting reading. WikiHow has a whole list of ways to tackle boring books and whilst I find their line "think of getting through a boring book as training for life" an incredibly depressing thought, the suggestions they have to take breaks, read away from interruptions, when most awake etc. are all useful.

Too time consuming: Of course, everyone is busy and finding time to read is hard. But this is a classic case of spend time now to save it later. You will save yourself an awful lot of wasted effort if you find out that you are not eligible and there is no point applying.

Disregarded: Treating applications as the end goal can be perpetuated by actual targets set for fundraisers for applications made. Or it can come from the sense that the Trustees and others will judge you if you have not populated a pipeline with many bids. The focus should always be on being effective – so your applications have a good chance of success – and not just volume.

Overlooked: The complacency effect happens where you think you know the guidance already or that you were funded before so must still fit. This can be a mistake where criteria and priorities have changed.

Ignored: Fundraisers are usually wonderfully optimistic and resilient souls and so hope sometimes wins over judgment. There is a danger of putting in a speculative application just in case it might be considered and in other cases, passion clouds

	<p>reality. Because the bid writer is so excited about their work and the difference it makes, they assume that funders will be equally blown away and will make an exception. If you think this applies to you, try a phone call – but only after you’ve read the guidance.</p> <p>Whatever the reason, the advice remains the same – before spending time on writing a bid, you must read the guidance and if you don’t fit with the criteria, don’t just go ahead and apply anyway. Put your precious time into another application, where you have a much better chance of being funded.</p>

Fundraising Advice – Hold a Fast Party	<p>The idea behind a Fast Party is not to plough through the buffet at a party as quickly as possible, but to ‘fast’ – as in abstaining from eating. A Fast Party is actually a non-event, whereby people are invited to a party that isn’t going to take place. This type of fundraiser works particularly well with well-known charitable organisations with a strong supporter base either locally or nationally. Guests are asked to go without one meal on a specific date and to contribute the money that would otherwise be spend on the meal to your not-for-profit. The advantage of this fundraising idea is that it:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Requires very little organising • Doesn’t require a venue • Has very little financial outlay – all you’re paying for is the cost of the invitations (and you could get a sponsor for this in return for a bit of advertising) • Can be quite easy to obtain sponsorship. <p>Disadvantages are relatively few. The main drawback is that supporters who may already be contributing to the charity or cause may feel ‘put upon’ by another request for help.</p>	

	<p>It's also a fundraising idea you should be wary of overusing. It's okay as a witty, fun one-off activity, but at best this should be an annual event and possibly take place even less frequently.</p> <p>To organise a Fast Party, find a couple or several friends to help write a Guest List and put together an eye-catching, well-designed and witty invitation (for example, 'Mr and Mrs Smith have pleasure in not requesting your company.....' or 'Guests of Honour will not include...").</p> <p>You could also print an unappetising menu on the back of the invitation to show 'participants' that they've had a lucky escape. Include a vegetarian option.</p> <p>Print the invitations on good quality card and include a self-addressed envelope or set up an online payment system so that participants can make their financial contribution easily – or you could just pop round to a supporters' house to collect their donation.</p> <p>Make sure that cheques are made out to the charity or cause rather than to an individual, which could lead you open to criticism or, worse, accusations of fraud. Tickets to the party could be £5 per person, £8 per couple or £10 per family, whatever you think is appropriate for your supporters.</p> <p>The advantage for 'participants' is that they don't have to do anything to participate. A Fast Party enables them to show their support for a cause at a relatively low cost without having to spend much effort, plan, or use up valuable time and effort.</p> <p>In terms of return, most Fast Parties report at least 50% of invitees making a donation. Some may not wish to participate but may still be willing to make a donation.</p> <p>Finally, always send a short thank-you letter, telling donors how the funding will be used and the difference it will make!</p>

<p>Fundraising – Auctions of Promises</p>	<p>Auctions of Promises tend to be most successful when held on the back of another event when equipment and furniture is already available.</p> <p>A good Auction of Promises (50 lots takes about an hour to get through if you have a good auctioneer) can often raise £1,000 or more.</p> <p>An Auction of Promises is held on identical lines to a conventional auction, but the ‘lots’ are quite different. Each lot is a ‘Promise’, usually written on individual slips of paper and signed and dated by the person offering the promise. Promises are secured by asking around your contacts, private companies or prominent individuals in the community, such as the Mayor or your local MP. It’s a good idea to have a wide selection of lots, for example, handmade goods, offers of help, vouchers, special opportunities and donated items. Example of promises can include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Theatre tickets • Having your car(s) cleaned • A free round of golf • A week’s holiday in a country cottage or an apartment overseas 	

- A free meal at a local restaurant

To organise an Auction of Promises, follow these steps:

1. Get together a small group of helpers or form a committee;
2. Decide on a date and a venue and apply for an occasional licence if you intend to run a bar, which could usefully increase the amount of funding raised;
3. Find an auctioneer who will ideally volunteer their time. If you can get one, a professional auctioneer will bring a sense of authenticity as well as ensuring the auction moves along at a brisk pace. If someone other than an experienced auctioneer wants to do it. It's essential they have a presence;
4. Proactively seek donations and promises. Make sure you get specific commitments from people or companies. Type up the promises and get them signed before the donor can pull out! Make it clear the offer is available for a limited period only, for instance 6 months or a year.
5. Prepare a catalogue showing images and the running order of all the lots which can be shown online or handed out at the event. It can help if you publish a reserve price for each lot to give participants an idea of where to begin bidding.

To keep things interesting:

Include a Surprise Auction: keep 2-3 popular lots in unmarked envelopes. Announce that the next lot is one of the unmarked promises, but bidders won't know which one it is. Participants make 'blind bids' and the successful bidder receives a surprise (it's important not to announce the lots until all have been auctioned).

Include a Sealed Bid Auction: this is where you display the lots and make pens, papers and envelopes available. Bidders place their bids in sealed envelopes and place them in a box. The winners are announced at the end of the Promises Auction. It's worth bearing in mind that Sealed Bid Auctions don't generally raise as much funding.

At the end of the Auction, try to encourage all successful bidders to pay before they leave. Thank the auctioneer with a bottle of wine and flowers. Make sure you have

	<p>sufficient volunteers to clear up. After the event, thank your donors, volunteers and successful bidders and let them know how much has been raised and how the funds will be used.</p> <p>Ensure the Auction is reported in the local and social media (this can also be done in real-time during the event), together with the amount raised. An Auction of Promises is a great PR opportunity because you can gain additional publicity as people redeem their promises throughout the 6 months or year.</p> <p>Finally, think about making it an annual event to develop your commercial and public supporter base!</p>

- CIO: Charity Incorporated Organisation (incorporated legal structure for charities regulated by the Charity Commission)
- Association with charitable aims and objectives: formal group with a constitution which is charitable but not registered with the Charity Commission (most likely because their income is below the £5,000 threshold)
- Constituted community group: formal group with a constitution which lays out issues around membership, who can make decisions, what they do and how they will use any money etc
- Un-constituted community group: generally small groups who have come together because of a shared issue, or to set up support within their geographical community. Tend to be organised informally and have no written rules around their group
- CASCs: Community and Amateur Sports Clubs. Groups who are constituted and whose core purpose is amateur sport.
