What are the **differences** between a tree protected by a TPO and a tree within a conservation area?

<ul> <li>An application can be refused, consented or a split decision can be issued</li> <li>Conditions can be attached to a consent eg replacement planting, quality of workmanship</li> </ul>	Preservation Order.  No conditions can be applied

What are the **similarities** between a tree protected by a TPO and a tree within a conservation area?

- The same offences apply if works or tree felling is undertaken when no application or six weeks notice has been submitted
- The same exemptions apply. 5 days notice should be provided to the Local Planning Authority to attend to remove dead or dangerous
  trees. Work undertaken by public utilities or to remove an obstruction from a public highway are exempt, however utility companies are
  encouraged to notify the Local Planning Authority of works. Actively managed hedges are exempt too but if they are within a conservation
  area and have not been managed and appear as a row of trees then a notification should be sent if they are to be removed or
  management commenced.
- The work proposals are valid for two years from the decision notice for both.
